Nels Peter Nelson was proud to be the first Swede appointed to the Duluth police department. He used to proclaim he could "lick any Irishman in town." His career was anything but illustrious and peaked in 1894 when he was appointed sergeant. After a budget cut demotion 3 years later, he was reprimanded several times for being drunk on duty, demoted to jailer and given a final warning for the same offense in 1907. He retired a year later.

- Newspaper clippings: Story of Duluth's Labor Riot Retold After 19 Years, Jul 5, 1908, Duluth, St Louis County, MN.

Nineteen years ago tomorrow, July 6, 1889 was a day to be remembered by all who were then residents of Duluth.

Two thousand men, women, and children fought the police and state militia for a whole day and were finally subdued by the state forces.

Four men were shot down or clubbed to death and a 15 year old boy was found dead after the rioters had been dispersed - his heart pierced with a rifle ball. Scores were wounded.

Two lynchings were attempted but frustrated by the police, who charged the armed rioters and rescued the victims of the mob. In that charge seven out of the 28 policemen were shot down, but none received fatal wounds.

At that time, a crew of laborers, mostly foreigners employed by Wolf & Truax, contractors, were working on West Superior street between Garfield and Seventeenth avenues west. The men, about 50 in all, went on strike for higher wages. Their demands were refused and their places filled by strike-breakers.

Immediately, the strike-breakers were attacked with stones, but on the first day of the trouble they were able to work under the protection of the police who occasionally fired a shot in the air to intimidate the hostile strikers.

The evening after the strike-breakers had been put to work the strikers and their friends held a secret meeting and the next morning their agents purchased 200 revolvers which they distributed among the striking workmen and their friends.

They had sworn vengeance on the police for their interference and had planned to kill several members of the force whom they had picked out. About two hours before the general riot broke out a little girl, fairly out of breath, ran to Patrolman Nels P. Nelson who is still on the force and jailer at police headquarters and informed him of the plot and what had been done at the meeting the night before.

He immediately notified headquarters and 28 of the best men of the force were hastily summoned and sent to the district. When they arrived at Garfield avenue they were met by a bloodthirsty mob of 2,000 or more people, many of whom opened fire on the officers and the policemen took refuge in an old mill which was then situated on Michigan avenue where the viaduct now stands. Revolvers, rifles and other weapons were flourished in every direction by the rioters, and to leave the building would have meant instant death for the policemen.

While Patrick Doran, who was then chief of police, was holding a consultation with his men who were being held prisoners in the mill, Joseph Wolf, one of the contractors, came in sight in a buggy.

Instantly the howling mob started after him, and realizing his danger, he whipped his horse up to escape, at the same firing at the crowd as he galloped off. His horse was shot down and soon the contractor was in the hands of the mob, who cried at the top of their lungs to lynch him.

It was time for the police to act and they charged the rioters and hundreds of shots were exchanged on both sides. Wolf was rescued by the policemen and brought to safety. When the policemen were able to return to their place of refuge, several of their men were wounded and it was discovered Detective Tom Hayden was in the hands of the mob.

Another charge was made on the crowd, but before the officers could reach Hayden he was carried to a sewer which had just been finished before paving of the street and dropped in. It was with great difficulty that his comrades succeeded in extricating him.

In the meantime, the state militia had been called out, and with drawn bayonets they succeeded in dispersing the mob and quelling the riot.

There are only a few who participated in the suppression of that riot still alive and residents of Duluth. Among them are three who are in the present police force: Nels P. Nelson, jailer at headquarters, Patrolman Bob Smollelt and Lieut. John Drannen who has charge of the West End precinct.

Patrick Doran, who was chief of police, is still in Duluth and in the saloon business. Hon. J. R. Sutphin was mayor and is still a resident of this city. One or two other men who were policemen at that time are engaged in business here.

Over 100 men were arrested, accused of rioting, and all were arraigned before Judge Page Morris, who was then on the municipal bench. Many were convicted and sent to prison and at the time the police department was severely scored by citizens who claimed they had wantonly shot down laborers.

The evidence at the inquest, however, exonerated the police officers, and it was shown that they had not fired on the rioters until forced to do so to protect themselves or to save others from harm.

"One incident that I remember very well," said Jailer Nelson, "was when in the heat of battle a young man, probably 16 years old, came running in front of Bob Benson, who was then a detective and leveling a revolver in each hand at him and me pulled the triggers as fast as he could.

"Suddenly a policeman's club rose in the air from the crowd and came down on the lad's head. He fell to the ground without making a sound and must have died instantly. One of the shots nearly cut Benson's ear off. I don't know how near the other shot came to me but I do know that whoever raised that club that brought down the boy, certainly saved our lives."

4-**Christine Nelson** was born in Dec 1884 in Duluth, St Louis County, MN, died on Aug 26, 1906 in Duluth, St Louis County, MN at age 21, and was buried in Scandia Cemetery, Duluth, MN. The cause of her death was paralysis. She had no relationships and no children.

Christine led a short and troubled life. Father, Nels Nelson described himself as a tough Swede who could "lick any Irishman in town." Was he that way with his children as well? Her mother, Hannah Nelson died when Christine was only four years old. Her step-mother, Lena Ackerman, had been the family housekeeper and by all accounts was a kind and loving woman.

Things went terribly wrong for Christine in her late teens and she may have fallen into prostitution. In 1905 she was living at Bethel Rescue Home in Duluth, a shelter for "fallen women and delinquent girls." A year later, she was dead from "paralysis." She is buried in Scandia Cemetery in an unmarked grave.
